Burgoyne Diller is considered the preeminent American practitioner of Mondrian's neo-Plasticism. Exhibited in "Burgoyne Diller" at the Whitney Museum of American Art in 1990, the present lot is thought to be a precursor of the 1960s American Minimalist art movement. The profoundly abbreviated expression is pioneering in its ultimate break with Mondrian. The departure from Mondrian is two-fold. First, Diller utilizes symmetry as opposed to asymmetry, a central tenet in the work of minimalists Donald Judd and Carl Andre.
